Anti Ragging Policy

The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India's Order dated 16.5.2007 directed the All-India Council for Technical Education (AICTE), New Delhi to strictly implement the following rules and regulations for the prevention and prohibition of ragging in technical Institutions. The AICTE has taken a very serious view of ragging incidents in educational institutions and has ordered their strict implementation.

Ragging is an evil act. There is zero tolerance for ragging at our university. According to the rules of the Hon'ble Supreme Court, anyone found to have engaged in ragging will be dismissed from the university. Ragging used to be the most terrifying feature of a freshmen's time in college in the dorms. In the past, ragging was responsible for numerous fatalities and suicides. Numerous students left their studies early, and many more sustained bodily harms.

The institute has an active Anti Ragging Committee and an Anti-Ragging Squad that maintain strict watch in the college grounds and the dorms to give the students a safe and secure environment where they may study without fear of being ragged.

There will be consequences for students who participate in or encourage ragging in technical institutes.

The following actions are done to stop any ragging incidents:

- 1. CCTV cameras are watching over the college's property.
- 2. Stationing security personnel close to first-year classes to deter senior students.
- 3. Running campaigns to raise awareness about ragging.
- 4. Both online and offline anti-ragging declarations must be submitted by students.
- 5. Students are required to sign a written pledge at the time of admission that they will not participate in ragging.
- 6. To prevent future instances of ragging, the punishment meted out to those who participated in it must be severe and justifiably exemplary. Any student caught participating in ragging should be prohibited from enrolling in any technical institution in India.
- 7. The institutional authorities are required to file a First Information Report (FIR) with the local police authorities for each instance of ragging.

- 8. Those found guilty of ragging at the institution level may be subject to any one or a combination of the following penalties, depending on the type and seriousness of the offense as determined by the institution's Anti Ragging Committee:
- a. Admission cancellation.
- b. Exclusion from class attendance.
- c. Refusing or withdrawing awards such as fellowships and scholarships.
- d. Being prohibited from taking any test, exam, or other evaluation process.
- e. Hiding outcomes.
- f. Being suspended from the hostel.
- g. Expulsion from the school for a period of one to four semesters.
- h. Expulsion from the school, which results in a ban on enrollment at any other institution.
- i. The institution must use collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on potential raggers when the people committing or aiding the crime of ragging are not identified.
- j. A hefty monetary fine.
- 9. The institutional authority must immediately notify the Council of any instances of ragging that occur on its property, together with any subsequent actions, and must periodically update the Council on the progress of the case.
- 10. To send the correct message that ragging is not only to be prohibited but also to be dealt with sternly, courts should try to guarantee that cases involving ragging are taken up on a priority basis.
